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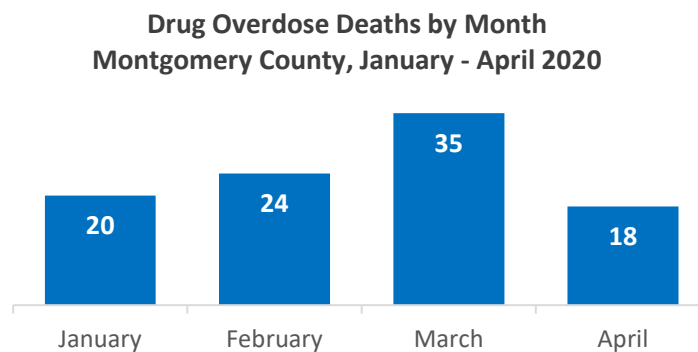
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## Drug Overdose Deaths

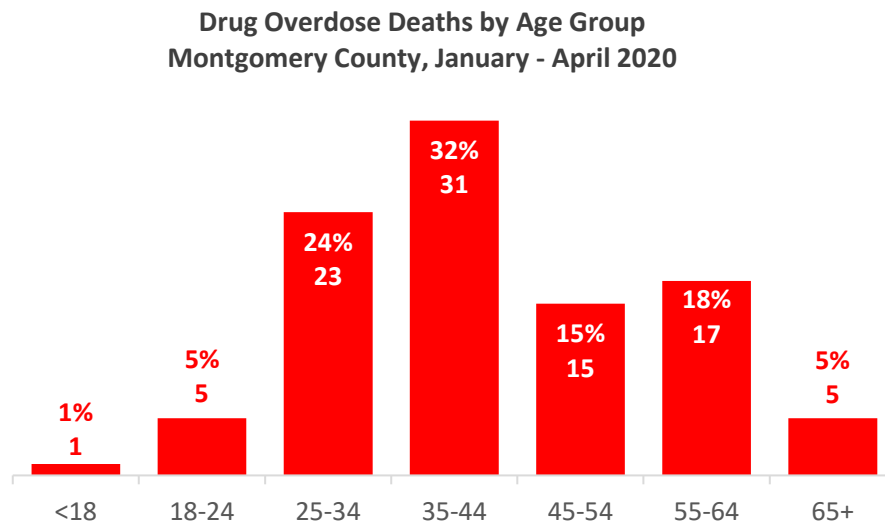
There were **97 confirmed drug overdose deaths** between January and April 2020; this is an increase of 21% from the same period in 2019 when there were 80 deaths.

Drug overdose deaths in this report include residents and non-residents of Montgomery County who died in Montgomery County. This report does not include residents who died outside of Montgomery County. Overdose death data are provided by the Montgomery County Coroner's Office. Deaths occurring after April 2020 are preliminary and not included in this report.

### Overdose Deaths by Month



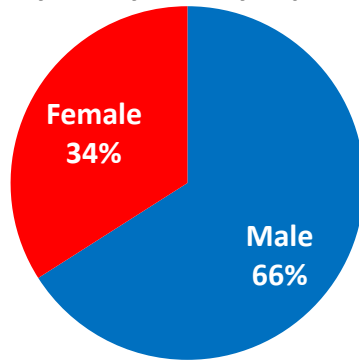
### Demographics

The highest percentage of drug overdose deaths occurred in the age group **35 to 44 years** (32%). Seventy-one percent of drug overdose deaths occurred among individuals aged 25 to 54 years.

Montgomery County, January - April 2020**

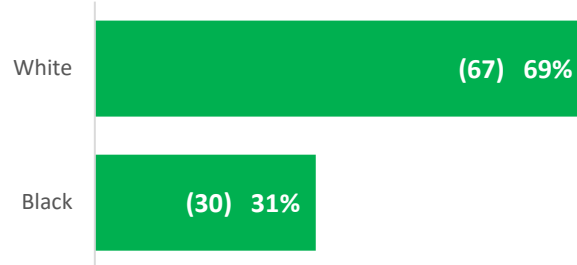


Thirty-four percent (33 of 97) of individuals who died of a drug overdose were **female** and 66% (64 of 97) were **male**.

The **percent who were female has decreased slightly**; between January and April of the prior year, females accounted for 38% (30 of 80) of drug overdose deaths.

**Whites** accounted for sixty-nine percent of drug overdose deaths from January to April 2020. Thirty (30) of the 97 drug overdose deaths were among **Blacks** (31% of the total). This is an **increase** from the first four months of 2019 when 14% (11 of 80) of overdose deaths were among Blacks.

**Increase Among Black Men**

Black men represented 23.7% of overdose deaths between January and April 2020. This is 3.8 times higher than in the same period of 2019, when 6.3% of individuals who died of a drug overdose were Black men.

In the first four months of 2019, there were 5 deaths among Black men. This increased to 23 between January and April of 2020. The number of deaths among other groups was similar during these time periods.

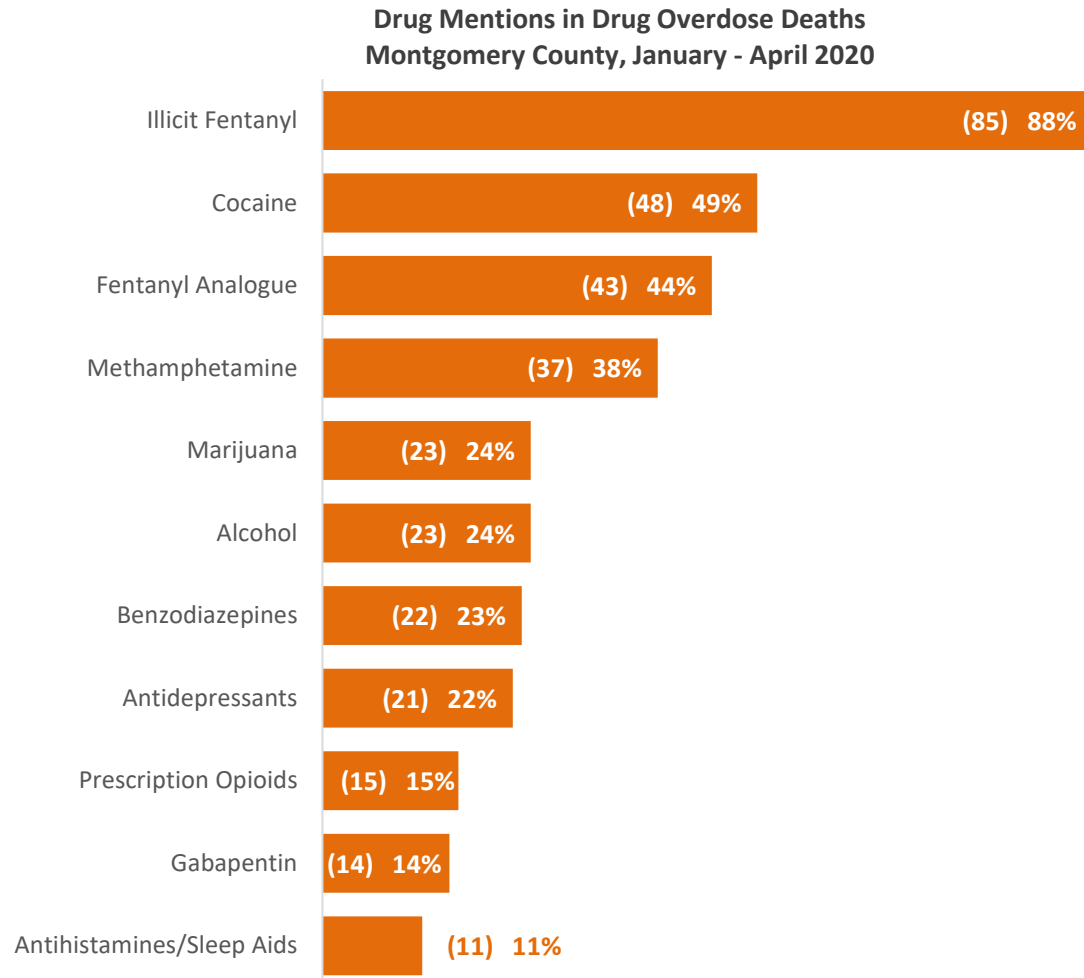

## Drug Types

### Definition of a Drug Mention

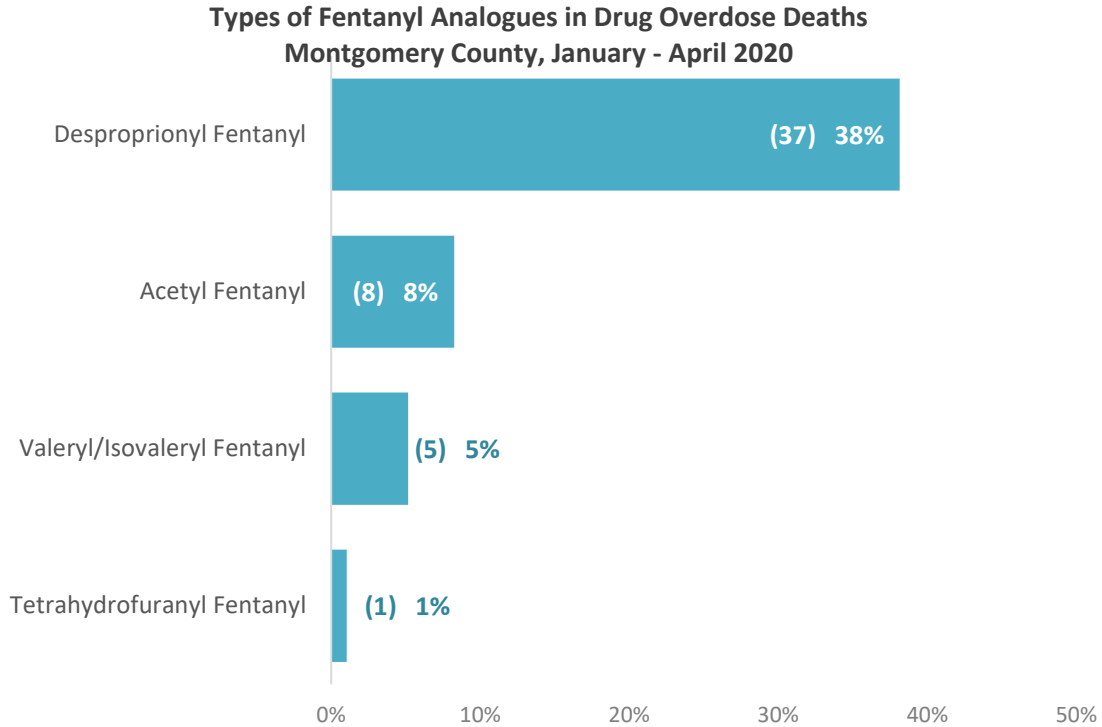
A drug “mention” means a specific drug was found in a bodily system of an individual who died, but the particular drug was not necessarily the sole cause of death. The presence of multiple drugs in a person's system can result in more than one mention for that individual.



Of those who died from a drug overdose, 88% had **illicit fentanyl** in their system, the most common drug mention during the first four months of 2020. **Cocaine** and **fentanyl analogues** (drugs with a similar chemical structure to fentanyl) were the second and third most common drug mentions, representing 49% and 44% of overdose deaths respectively.

The percent of deaths involving **illicit fentanyl increased** by 13% from 78% during the same time frame in 2019, while the percent involving **fentanyl analogues decreased** by 10% from 49%. The percent of deaths involving **cocaine increased** by 14% from 43%,

## Fentanyl Analogues



**Despropionyl fentanyl** (found in 38% of deaths between January and April) was the most common fentanyl analogue found during drug overdose autopsies, followed by **acetyl fentanyl** (found in 8% of deaths).

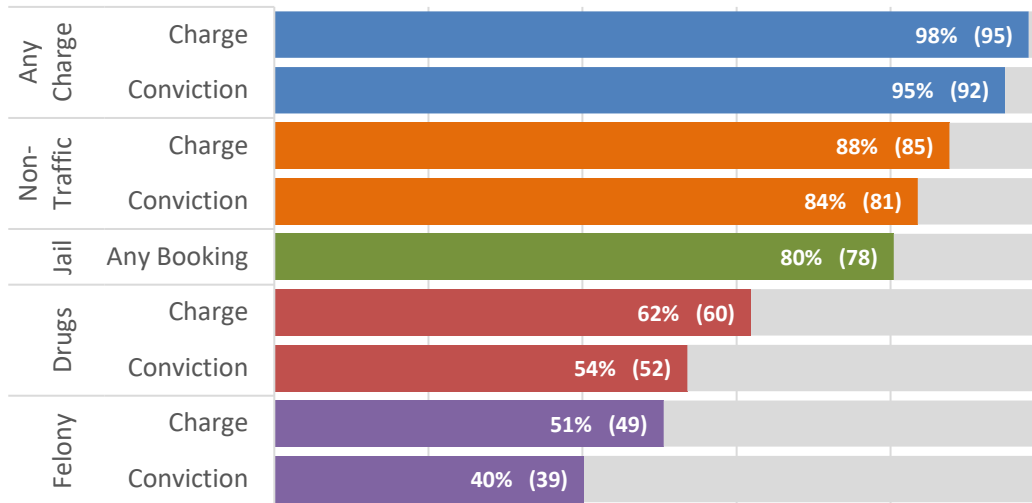
**Carfentanil**, the most common fentanyl analogue in 2017, was not present in any autopsies between January and April 2020.

## Criminal History

This section presents law enforcement data on the individuals who died of a drug overdose in Montgomery County during January through April 2020. These data are collected from JusticeWeb, a portal that aggregates information from criminal justice agencies in and around Montgomery County. Note that not all agencies report data to JusticeWeb. Convictions include jury verdicts and pleading guilty.

Fifty-six percent (54 of 97) of individuals had contact with the criminal justice system within **one year** of death; 8% (8) had contact within **one month** of death and 4% (4) had contact within **one week** of death. This is consistent with the same time period of 2019.

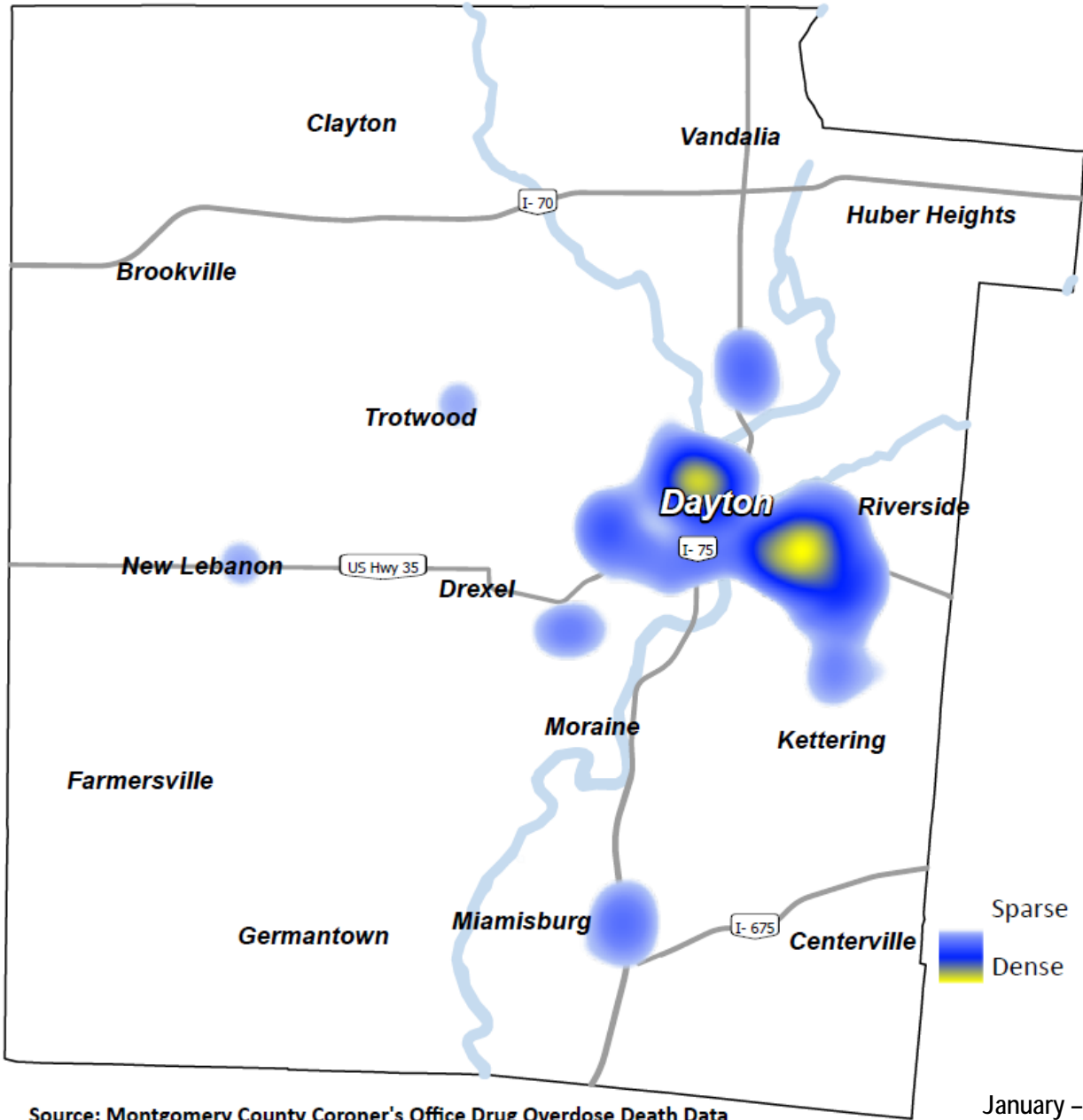

Sixty-two percent (60 of 97) of individuals who died of an overdose had a prior **Drug Charge**. The next most common criminal charges were **Robbery/Theft** (51%), **Disorderly Conduct** (38%), **Assault** (30%), **OVI** (30%), and **Public Intoxication** (28%). In the same time period during 2019, Drug Charges were most common, followed by Robbery/Theft, OVI, Assault, and Disorderly Conduct.

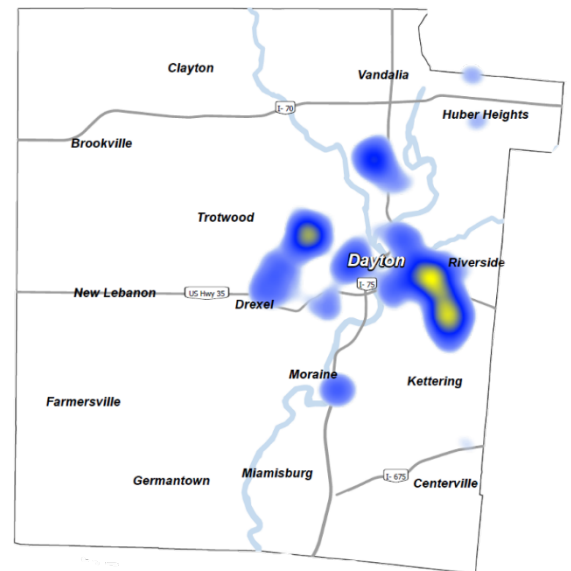
## Density of Drug Overdose Deaths by Incident Location Montgomery County, January - April 2020

## Drug Overdose Emergency Department Visits

Data regarding drug overdose emergency department visits come from EpiCenter, Ohio’s syndromic surveillance system. Drug-related visits were counted as overdoses if descriptions specifically stated the terms "OD" or "overdose." Drug-related visits with references to suicidal ideations or intentional self-harm, or to everyday drugs such as Tylenol or insulin, were excluded from overdose counts. Numbers in this section represent an estimate and may not reflect the true number of drug overdoses due to variability in visit descriptions and the inconsistent use of ICD codes.

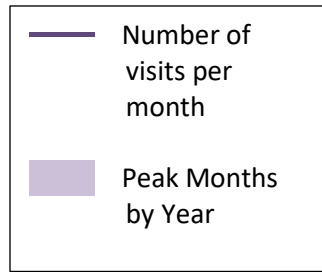

Montgomery County ranks **4<sup>th</sup>** (of 88 counties) for the **highest number** of drug overdose (OD) visits to emergency departments (ED) and **7<sup>th</sup>** (of 88 counties) for the **highest rate** of such visits. These rankings are consistent with the first half of 2019.

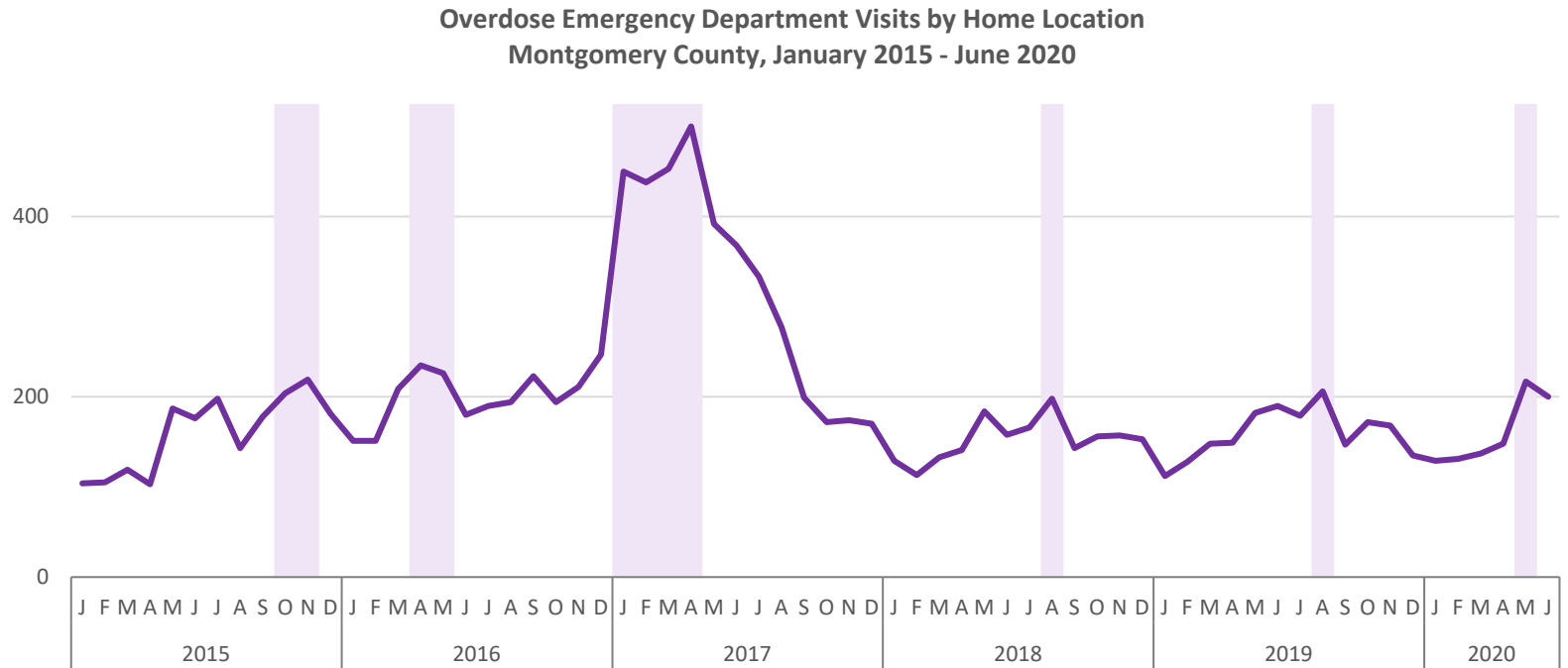
The rate of overdose visits represents a **slight increase** from January through June 2019, when Montgomery County had 341.7 visits per 100,000 residents.

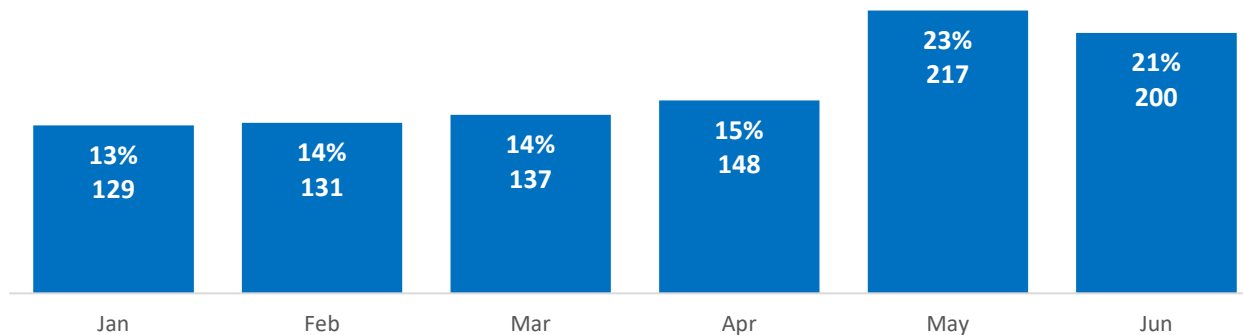
## Emergency Department Visits by Montgomery County Residents



Between 2015 and 2020, the months with the **highest number of overdoses** varied by year but tended to occur during **warmer seasons**.

Between **January and June 2020**, there were **962 overdose ED visits** made by Montgomery County residents. This is a **6% increase** from the first half of 2019 during which there were 909 visits. This is an average of 5.3 visits per day in the first half of 2020.

The number of visits increased slightly between January and April before increasing by 47% in May. In the first half of 2019, the month with the highest number of overdose visits was June with 190 visits.

**Miami Valley Hospital** had the highest percentage of Montgomery County resident overdose visits to their Emergency Department (39.7% of all visits). This is consistent with prior years. Eight percent (7.8% or 75 visits) of Montgomery County resident overdose ED visits were made to hospitals outside of Montgomery County.

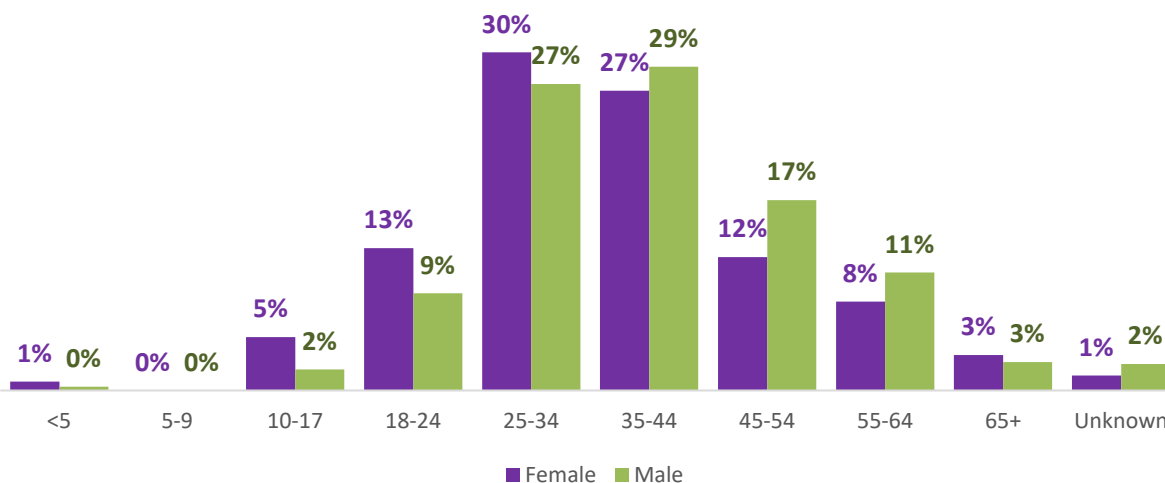

There was a total of 862 Montgomery County residents who visited an ED for a drug overdose in the first half of 2020 for a total of 962 visits. Of the 862 residents, 68 (7.9%) visited an ED for an overdose more than once. The percent of patients with multiple visits is consistent with prior years.

#### Age and Sex

### Overdose Emergency Department Visits by Age and Sex Montgomery County, January - June 2020



Sixty-one (61%) percent of overdose ED visits were **male**, 39% were female. This is an increase in the percent who were male over the same time period during 2019. Patients ages **25 to 54** years accounted for 72% of overdose ED visits in January to June 2020; this is also consistent with 2019. Female patients (average age 36.4 years) tended to be younger than male patients (average age 38.9 years); 18% (69 of 376) of female patients were younger than 25 years of age, while 11% (64 of 586) of male patients were younger than 25.

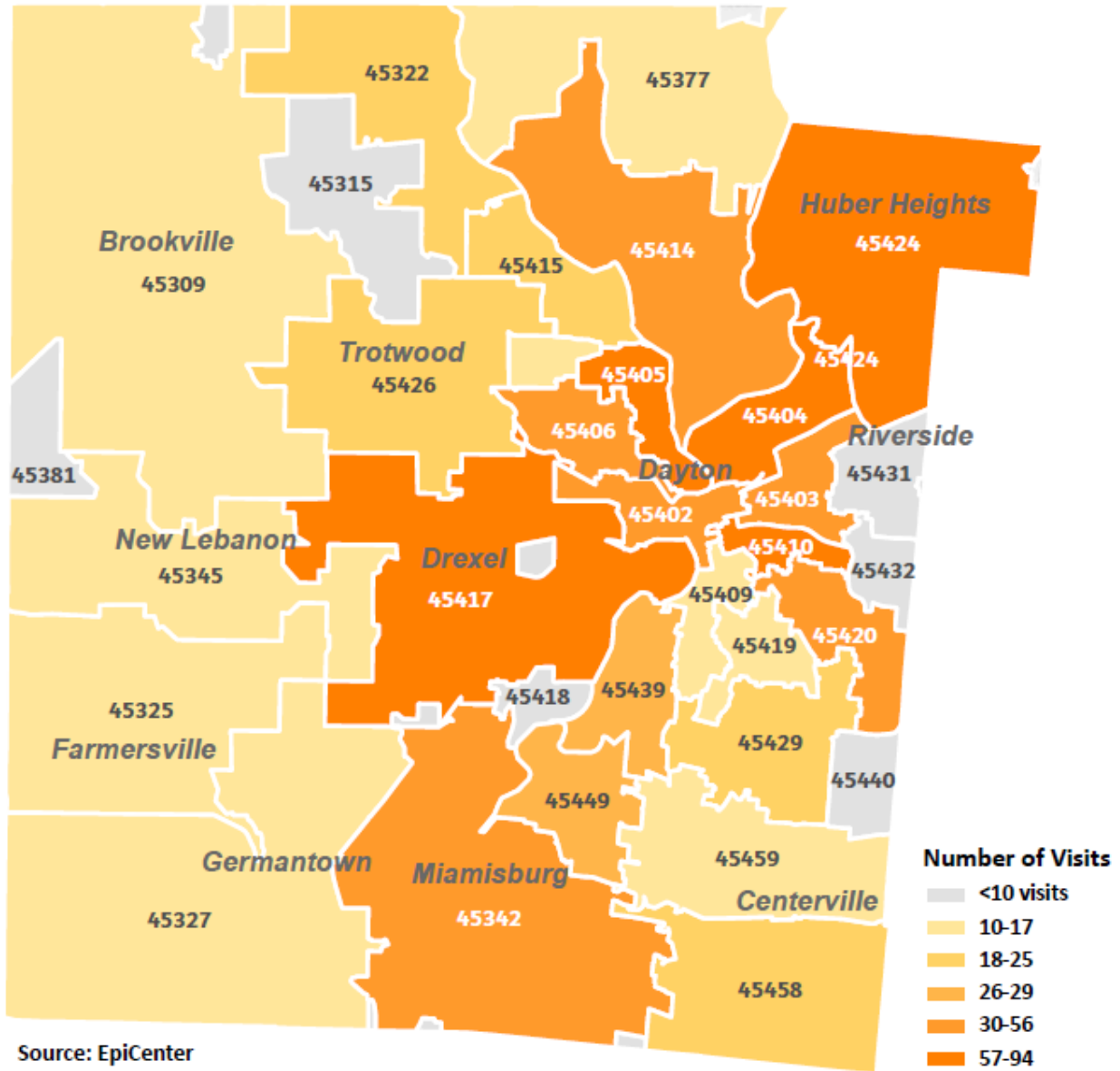

Zip code **45404** had the **highest rate** (12.4 per 1,000 per year) of overdose ED visits. Zip code 45417 falls to 6<sup>th</sup> when taking its population into account with a rate of 6.4 per 1,000 per year. In the first half of 2019, 45402 had the highest rate of visits, while 45404 had the second highest rate.

## Number of Overdose Emergency Department Visits by Home Zip Code Montgomery County, January - June 2020

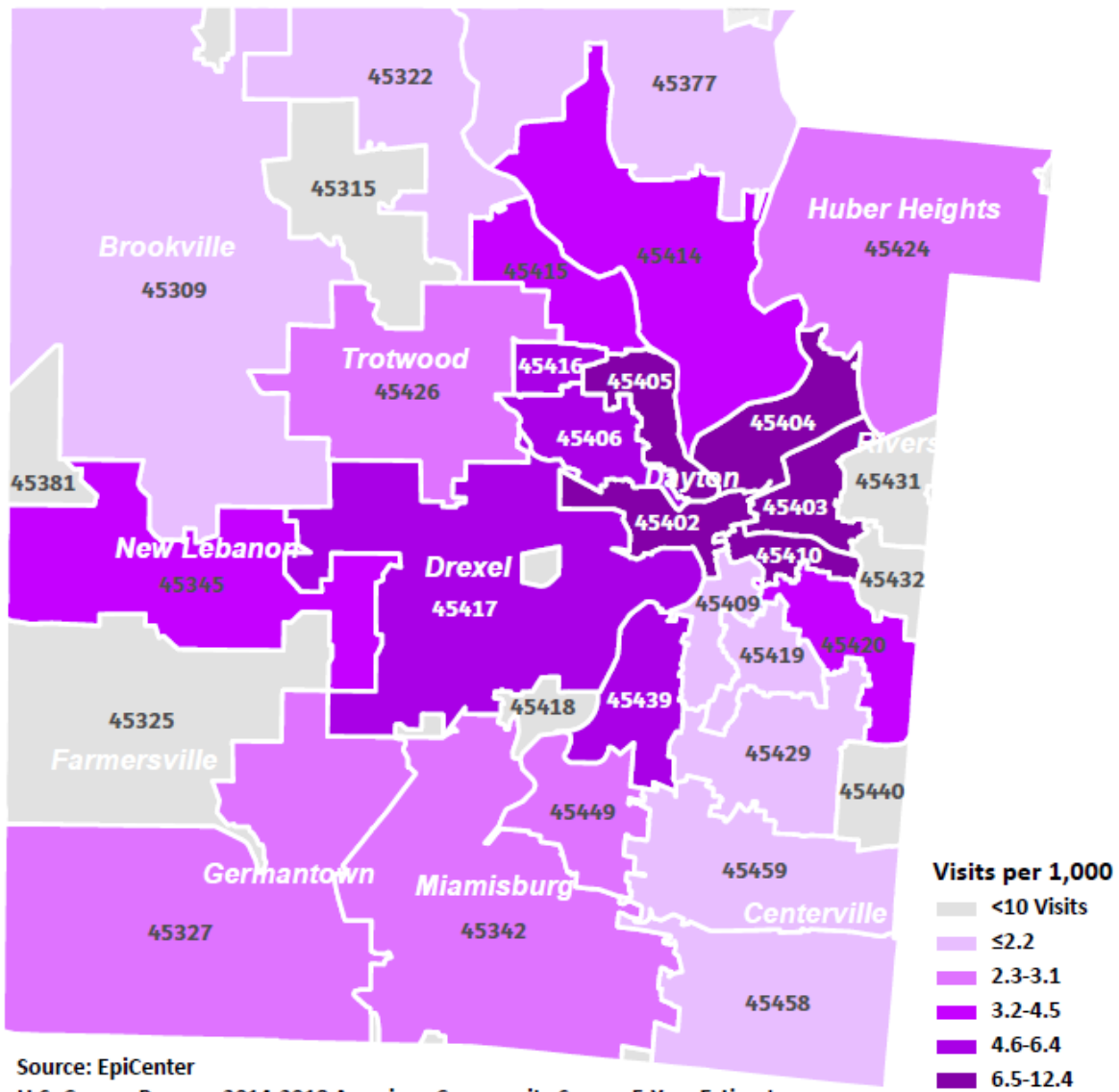

## Harm Reduction Initiatives

### Syringe Services (CarePoint)

The CarePoint Syringe Services program began on April 17, 2015. The program currently operates at three separate locations: Life Enrichment Center (LEC), Vogel Health Center, and CarePoint Mobile Unit near East End Community Services.

Between January and June 2020, there were **2,696 encounters** and a total of **142,743 syringes** exchanged. This represents a **12% decrease in the number of encounters**, but a **5% increase in the number of syringes**.

From January to June 2020, Montgomery County agencies **distributed 1,234** Naloxone kits to new recipients and **refilled 1,580** for a **total of 2,814 kits**. This is similar to the total number of kits distributed in the first half of 2019.

EMS agencies in Montgomery County **administered 2,100 doses** of naloxone in the first half of 2020, **a 23% increase** when compared to the first half of 2019 (1,704 doses). Kits provided by Project DAWN are reported to have **reversed 98 overdoses**.

## Drug Seizure

### Law Enforcement Drug Seizures and Forfeitures

The Regional Agencies Narcotics and Gun Enforcement (R.A.N.G.E.) Task Force includes twelve law enforcement agencies in Montgomery and Clark Counties and works to combat drug abuse and trafficking.

Miami Valley Bulk Smuggling Task Force includes six agencies that conduct criminal investigations utilizing their investigative authority to protect the citizens of the Miami Valley by disrupting and dismantling international drug trafficking organizations.

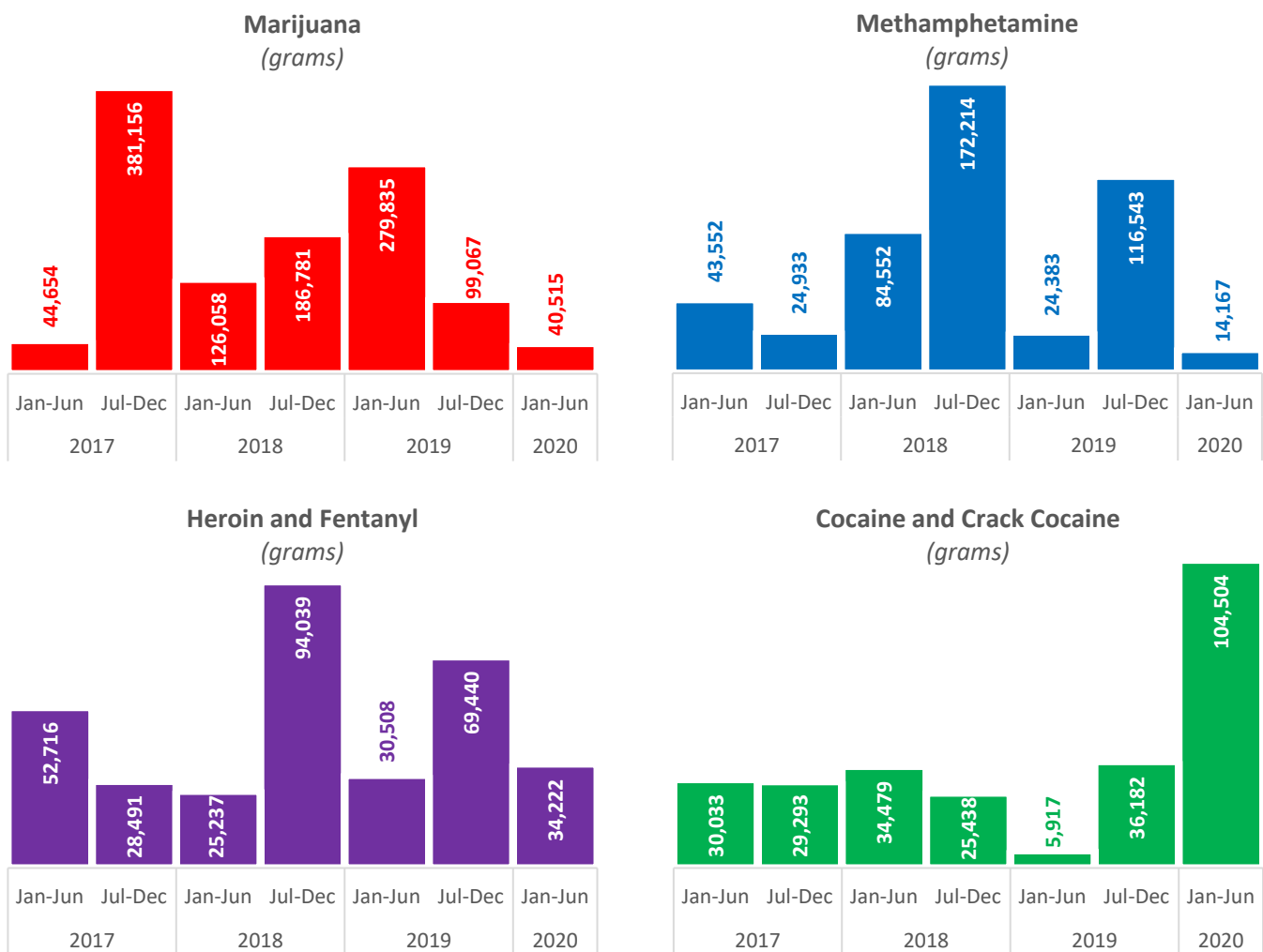

## Drugs Seized

Drugs seized by law enforcement provide a snapshot of drugs present in the community. Between January and June of 2020, the Miami Valley Bulk Smuggling Task Force, R.A.N.G.E., and Dayton Police Department's Narcotics Bureau seized a combined 104,504 grams of cocaine and crack cocaine, 40,515 grams of marijuana, 34,222 grams of heroin and fentanyl, and 14,167 grams of methamphetamine.

Seizures of methamphetamine, heroin/fentanyl, and marijuana have decreased compared to the second half of 2019. The number of grams of cocaine seized was 2.9 times higher than in the previous time period.

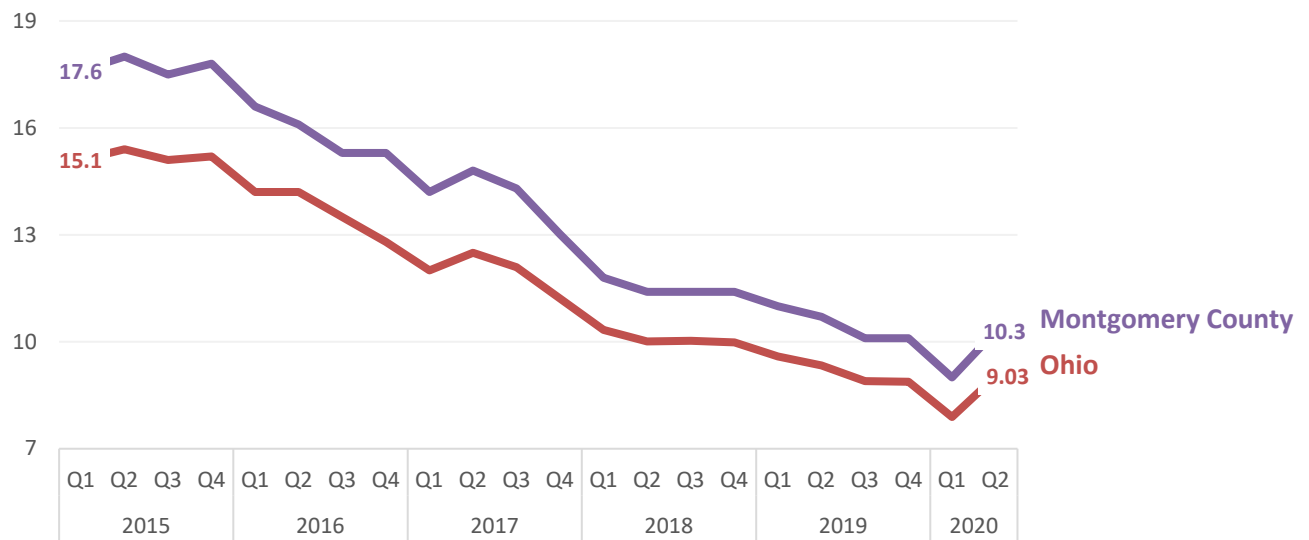
# Prescription Opioids

## Prescriptions by Quarter

### Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (OARRS)

The Ohio Automated Rx Reporting System (OARRS) allows prescribers and pharmacies to monitor opioid prescriptions and address overprescribing and “doctor shopping” in the state of Ohio. The charts below represent the number of doses dispensed per capita; this is the total number of doses sold to patients at pharmacies divided by the total population.

**Opioid Doses Dispensed per Capita  
Montgomery County and Ohio; January 2015 - June 2020**



Between 2015 and June 2019, the rate of opioids dispensed per capita was **higher in Montgomery County** than in the State of Ohio. The number of Opioid doses dispensed per capita has **decreased** consistently since 2015 in both Montgomery County and Ohio, with a **14% increase in Quarter 2 of 2020** for both the state and county.

It is unclear if this increase results from change in prescribing practices amid the COVID-19 pandemic. Quarter 3 and 4 data may illuminate this further.

## **Treatment**

The Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services (ADAMHS) of Montgomery County is responsible for the planning, funding and monitoring of public mental health and addiction treatment services for individuals and families of Montgomery County, Ohio. Under Ohio law, the ADAMHS Board is one of 50 Boards coordinating the public behavioral health and addiction treatment and recovery system in Ohio. Montgomery County contracts with provider agencies to deliver services that assist consumers and clients on the road to recovery.
