Situational Status Report

Community Overdose Action Team (COAT)

Situation to date

- As of September 5, 2021, per the Montgomery County Coroner's Office, there were **242*** suspected accidental drug overdose deaths from January 1 – September 5, 2021 (*April – September 2021 data still preliminary).
- The Community Overdose Action Team recognized International Overdose Awareness Day on August 31, 2021. The day allowed us to raise awareness around overdoses and strive to reduce the stigma associated with overdoses and addiction in our community. We know that overdose is preventable. As a community, we must continue to provide comprehensive services for those fighting the disease of addiction. We must inspire others to know that recovery is possible and let them know that we are here to help them. As part of the day, we encouraged Dayton and Montgomery County agencies and residents to pause for a moment of silence at 12:00 pm on Tuesday, August 31, to remember those who have lost their lives to drug overdose and addiction. Additionally, Montgomery County and the City of Dayton both issued proclamations and illuminated various parts of our community in purple lighting.
- Branches will remain meeting virtually for the foreseeable future due to the increase in COVID-19 cases.
- Operational period still stands at 60 days.

7. Drug Supply Control

Drug Supply Control represent the work of our local task forces.

Drugs seized by law enforcement provide a snapshot of drugs present in the community.

Montgomery County has three task forces working to remove unwanted drugs from our streets:

- Miami Valley Bulk Smuggling Task Force - includes six agencies that conduct criminal investigations utilizing their investigative authority to protect the citizens of the Miami Valley by disrupting and dismantling international drug trafficking organizations.
- Regional Agencies Narcotics and Gun Enforcement (R.A.N.G.E) Task Force - includes twelve law enforcement agencies in Montgomery County and works to combat drug abuse and trafficking.
